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MCA Chicago's exhibition *Gary Simmons: Public Enemy* to touch on themes of history, memory, and popular culture

CHICAGO— The Museum of Contemporary Art (MCA) Chicago's upcoming exhibition, *Gary Simmons: Public Enemy*, a 60+ piece survey of artist Gary Simmons's work, opens on June 13, 2023. The presentation, organized by James W. Alsdorf Chief Curator René Morales, Assistant Curator Jadine Collingwood, and Curatorial Assistant Jack Schneider, is the most comprehensive look at Simmons's work to date.

Simmons's artwork exposes the hidden histories that permeate U.S. visual culture, drawing from a host of popular genres including sports, cinema, television, music, architecture, and art. In this timely exhibition, audiences will gain a holistic understanding of the role played by these and other cultural outlets in shaping social understandings of race and collective memory.

Artworks like *Step Into the Arena* (*The Essentialist Trap*), 1994, and *Lineup*, 1993, address the spectacularization of Black bodies within the media, sports industry and other forms of mass media entertainment. *Disinformation Supremacy Board*, 1989, and *Six-X*, 1989, tackle the ideological undercurrents that run beneath the versions of history that are passed on through the educational system. Consisting of three immense drawings created directly on the museum's walls especially for this exhibition, *1964*, 2006, alludes to well-known examples of urbanism, architecture, and popular cinema to reveal forgotten stories of social unrest and political struggle. In numerous series that reference cult films such as *Texas Chainsaw Massacre*, *Deliverance*, and *Conquest of the Planet of the Apes*, Simmons takes on Hollywood's role in shaping who we are and what we remember. Works like *Hold Up*, *Wait a Minute*, 2021, and *Rogue Wave*, 2021, draw from racist imagery in vintage animation, including Disney and Looney Tunes cartoons from the 1930s and 1940s, to address the anxieties and turbulence of the contemporary moment.

Additionally, the MCA will present *Recapturing Memories of the Black Ark*, 2014-ongoing, a sculptural installation inspired by the recording studio of legendary Jamaican record producer Lee

'Scratch' Perry. Built from materials found in the Tremé neighborhood of New Orleans after the devastation of Hurricane Katrina, the sculpture serves as an open platform for conversation, music, and performance. The MCA will be activating the work at different locations throughout Chicago. The schedule for these talks and performances will be announced in early 2023.

GARY SIMMONS uses icons and stereotypes of American popular culture to create works that address personal and collective experiences of race and class.
